CELEBRATING

- ★ check your cupboards or freezer before you shop so you don't double up
- ★ buy local seasonal festive food and drinks, including loose veg
- try to avoid panic and bulk buying, most shops are only closed for a couple of days
- make a note of quick easy recipes for using up
- ★ invite friends and neighbours to bring food and drinks over for a pot-luck lunch or supper
- ★ avoid excessive packaging and make sure any trays, boxes or wrappers can be recycled
- * swap foil or clingfilm for storage dishes with lids or reusable covers
- ★ compare the price of eating in a restaurant or pub to cooking at home, it might be more costeffective to eat out than you think

Re-use and re-purpose to reduce costs and remember, less is often more!




Artificial trees need to be used for a minimum of 10 years for their environmental impact to be lower than that of a real tree.

If you can't face a fake, or create an alternative, buy a tree with roots (from a certified Grown In Britain supplier) so it can be replanted.








★ baubles don't need to be bling, avoid plastic and glitter (unless you are re-using ones you already have)

DRESSING

Spending the festive period in pyjamas is the idea of heaven for some (don't judge!), but not so ideal if you are off to a Christmas party or entertaining at home!

Fast fashion might seem a cheap wardrobe fix, but it definitely costs more than its price tag. Why not rescue something from the back of your wardrobe, or borrow or swap outfits with a friend?



- ★ check out charity shops and the Community Wardrobe (see our Circular Dorking directory) - a great source of 'good as new' occasion wear
- ★ accessorise or customise something you already have. Dorking Repair Café (see our Circular Dorking directory) might be able to help if you get stuck
- * shop local for something you can adapt and wear again
- ★ if you need to buy something, visit shops selling eco-friendly and sustainably sourced clothing. Not sure? Ask, it's good to chat
- pass on pre-loved items! Donate clothes you no longer wear which still have life in them

Other ways to celebrate with less waste...

- ★ donate to a charity instead of posting cards
- ★ need to buy cards? Check they are from recycled or sustainable sources and can be recycled again after Christmas
- ★ set a timer to switch off indoor and outdoor lights. Switch to LED or solar to reduce extra energy bills
- ★ make or bake gifts for friends and family
- ★ give your time to help others
- ★ keep costs and the number of presents down by doing a friends or family Secret Santa
- ★ re-gift unwanted gifts donate to a charity shop, or offer them as raffle prizes (see our Circular Dorking directory for our charity members)

Health and wellbeing

- * swap the TV and armchair for fresh air (an hour's walk will save the equivalent of 170g of CO₂)
- ditch the car for journeys within walking distance and avoid long car journeys if you can. Stay local or arrange car shares if you are travelling further afield to visit family or friends
